

1st-2nd Grade Zooheroes

A bird that can fly at speeds of 200mph? A cat that can leap 12 feet into the air? Animals can be out of this world when it comes to their super adaptations. Come to Summer Camp and discover these animals and their incredible superpowers. Each day, we will look at a superhero with amazing superpowers, and then see if our Zoo animals can measure up to their spectacular abilities. The camp will include Zoo hikes, games, and up-close live animal encounters.

1st-2nd Grade Where In the World

All aboard! Summer Campers will take a journey from the North to South Pole, visiting every habitat in between! Along the way they'll experience live classroom animal encounters, Zoo hikes to animals from every continent, and games and activities that take them around the globe. It's sure to be an adventure they won't forget!

3rd-4th Grade Expedition Naturalist

Campers will become naturalists as they choose their own adventure with 5 daily expeditions. Each expedition will traverse through the world's different biomes. As campers complete each adventure, they will become equipped with the knowledge and tools it takes to become a real naturalist.

5th-6th Grade Exploring Enrichment

What do boomer balls, spices, braided butcher paper, and fishsicles all have in common? They are different forms of animal enrichment! Enrichment provides stimulation to our Zoo animals keeping their minds and bodies healthy. In this camp, we will learn about the different forms of animal enrichment, who and what they are good for, and the role of the Zoo's enrichment committee through animal encounters, keeper interactions, games, and other activities. We will even create animal enrichment items and brainstorm some new ideas.

7th-8th Grade Working with Wildlife

Animal keepers, field researchers, forensic zoologists, animal trainers...the list goes on and on when it comes to jobs that work with wildlife. We will have hands-on animal encounters, meet a variety of speakers, and go on instructor-led hikes to explore habitats around the Zoo. Become a backyard biologist exploring fields, forests, and wetlands at our 700-acre Bowyer property! Participants will learn to protect wild spaces through activities such as bird watching, butterfly tagging, and animal tracking. Our camp will encourage your child to get back in touch with their wild side and build confidence as they hone their naturalist skills. On Friday, your camper will lead you on a nature hike to show off their new skills.

Note: This camp takes place at a satellite location, the Zoo's Bowyer Property in Mason, OH. Before and After Care is not available for camps hosted at Bowyer Farm. Campers will spend all their time outside and immersed in nature. Please dress accordingly and plan to get dirty or wet!

Zoo Troop Overview

What is Zoo Troop?

Learning and growing is fun at the Cincinnati Zoo & Botanical Garden! Zoo Troop is a once-a-week, 4-week series for toddlers through 8th graders designed to spark curiosity, build empathy, and encourage healthy social skills while fostering knowledge and respect for wildlife and wild places.

Each class includes interactive activities in the classroom, Zoo hikes, and close encounters with ambassador animals. Older participants also take on a series-long project or presentation, giving them the chance to dive deeper and share what they've learned. With the same knowledgeable instructor leading each week, children can build positive relationships while exploring new topics that connect them to the wild world around them.




Sustainable Urban Landscapes

Overnight Adventures®

The gates are shut, the lights are down, and everyone has gone home for the day. It's time to discover the Zoo after dark! Go behind closed doors and get up-close with animal encounters, hikes, and games. After a night of adventure, tuck into your sleeping bag overlooking the animals and then wake up the next morning to breakfast and a special animal experience. The fun doesn't have to stop there as next day admission is included and you can explore the Zoo on your own!

Adventures in Adaptations

Adaptations are the key to life! Join us as we explore how animals find their food, escape predators, find a mate, and overall SURVIVE in all their unique habitats. Throughout the night we'll explore a few places in the Zoo, participate in fun, educational activities, get a behind-the-scenes sneak peek, and meet some of our animal ambassadors up-close and personal! Then, after the fun, curl up in our private education classrooms overlooking our rainforest.

African Predator Prowl

On the African plains, it's survival of the fittest! Discover the adaptations predators have to hunt and how their prey has evolved to give them a fighting chance. We'll observe our incredible African predator and prey species, investigating what it takes for these animals to survive. You'll go behind-the-scenes to our African animal care staff areas to see how we bring expert care and attention to these extraordinary species. Then after the fun, curl up in our private education classrooms overlooking our rainforest.

Sleep with the Manatees

Our local species play vital roles in maintaining healthy ecosystems. They help regulate prey populations, disperse seeds, pollinate plants, cycle nutrients, and enrich the soil. Elephant Trekking at Night

Join us for a wild new Overnight Adventure where teamwork takes center stage! Discover the incredible ways animals cooperate to survive and thrive. From elephant herds led by wise matriarchs to the organized chaos of ant colonies, you'll discover the power of working together in the animal kingdom. As night falls, we'll trek through the Zoo, meet incredible animal ambassadors, and uncover the secrets of animal communities in action. We'll even go behind-the-scenes in the Elephant Trek Pump Room and explore the fascinating CREW Discovery Station, where conservation comes to life. Then, wind down the night in our private education classrooms overlooking our rainforest.

Note: There is the possibility to sleep in the Elephant Trek event space on Monday nights only. For all other nights, participants will sleep in our Education Rainforest building.

Twiga Tented Safari

Only available April–October. A truly one-of-a-kind experience, our Twiga Tented Safari will take you across the African grasslands. We'll traverse through Africa, listening to tales of innovation for living harmoniously with wildlife, such as how a flashlight can shield you against lions, or why a puppy raised with goats can save cheetahs. On our safari, we will get behind-the-scenes at Hippo Cove and uncover secrets of our world-famous bloat. We'll finish up our night at our Twiga tents, gathered round a roaring campfire roasting s'mores. Then, this unique adventure ends with a relaxing night in our shared safari tents on cozy cots and waking up to breakfast overlooking Giraffe Ridge.
